

Gardening Tips

We welcome the first in a series of monthly pieces from Josie Nunn, of Chilmark Horticultural Society.

After such a wet start to the year, it has been lovely to see signs of spring around the village - daffodils, bluebells and beautiful blossom have been a very welcome sight. May is always a busy month in the garden, but here are three jobs to think about.

Why not sow some beans? Runner beans will need something to climb up - a row or wigwam of bamboo canes is good. Not keen on runner beans? You could try French beans or even Borlotti beans with their beautiful mottled pink pods. Dwarf French beans can be grown in a large tub if you don't have ground space.

May is the traditional month in which the RHS Chelsea Flower Show is held and it is also the time to give our summer flowering perennials the *Chelsea Chop*. Try cutting back some of the stems by a third, to prolong the flowering season, and to prevent *flopping*. This works particularly well for perennials such as Sedums, Phlox, Aster, Echinacea, Rudbeckia, Heleniums, Penstemons and Nepeta.

Towards the end of May is the perfect time to plant out summer bedding in borders, tubs and hanging baskets. If you're doing this, please can we ask you to consider putting aside a couple of plants for us to sell at the Church fete in June? More info to come on this in the June edition.






Chilmark Cricket Club

First match of the season

After seven months of torpor the cricket season got underway in classic Chilmark fashion on 24 April, with a dismal batting collapse against Fonthill. Perhaps aware of

the brittle line-up at his disposal, skipper Carl Jacobs decided to delay the inevitable when he won the toss, and elected to bowl first. Alas, there was nowhere to hide. After two overs Fonthill were on 25 and Darren Lee had sent down four wides.

There were chances though. The Doc sacrificed healthy blood flow in his right hand when he stuck a mitt out in a foolhardy attempt to bring in a powerful drive. And then, shortly after, he was called into action when Brand King tempted a batter into a skied shot and decided that, despite being closest to it, the Doc needed a chance to redeem himself. The result was the same.

The flow of runs was halted in the fifth over when Ben Eastmond struck, before Paul Butler got two in six balls. It was a pretty even battle after that as King chipped in with a couple of wickets, and Ned Pattenden's unheralded slow/medium pace kept a lid on scoring. But 125 was always going to be a challenge in the fading light.

As it was, the team barely got out of first gear. Tony Lewis went for three after changing his bat and then not using it. King managed five before playing around one. Max Allen looked the most likely after his first two sweetly timed shots went straight to fielders. When he mishit his third over the mid-wicket boundary for six, things looked back on track. Then he was clean bowled.



There was little respite thereafter. Eastmond (2), Ben Fowles (1), Lee (2), Butler (3), and the Doc (6), all came and went in underwhelming style. In a rarely uttered sentence, Ricky Corbin was the top scorer. Utilising his famed Corbin Scoop, the Warminster accountant swiped everything that came his way crudely to the onside. He chugged his way to 15 defiant runs, before finally skying one for the 'keeper. Not to be outdone, Pattenden chipped in with 14 runs of his own, at one stage playing an actual cricket shot down to the third man boundary.

It was all in vain, however, as Jacobs, undefeated on 0, was the last man standing in a dismal 71 run innings. But of course, cricket in April doesn't count, everyone knows that.

Astronomy Notes

Extinction Event?

Looking at the Moon with binoculars or telescopes, one can see that it is completely covered with impact craters from the new and very large *Oriental Basin*, some 600 miles in diameter, to tiny pits only a few millimetres in size. The planet Mercury has similar surface features, as do Mars and most of the ice moons of the Gas giant planets such as Jupiter and Saturn. Why, then, are we not aware of similar features on Earth given it has been subjected to the same conditions as the rest of the Solar system?

There have been over 200 verified impact craters found on Earth, all large or very large - some more than 400 km. There are very few smaller and medium ones for the following reasons:

- a) Plate tectonics
- b) Weather erosion rain, wind, frosts and glaciers
- c) Volcanism
- d) Thick Atmosphere.

These processes erase the evidence of the small craters over short periods of time, ie 10s of thousands of years. Without all the above, the Earth would look just like the Moon.

Every day 14 tons of material fall onto the Earth from space, mostly small grains like sand and dust and an occasional brick sized object. There have, however, been some larger objects that have caused some panic in the last 150 years. The latest one that was reported worldwide was the *house sized* object that exploded over the Russian town of Chelyabinsk in 2013 at high altitude, with a force 30 times that of the Hiroshima atomic bomb. An even bigger object, some 500m in size, exploded over Tungusta in Russia in 1908, flattening more than 2,000 square kilometres of forest with a force of 12 megatons of TNT. These two objects were probably parts of a comet composed mostly of ice and dust.

Some 25 to 50,000 years ago, a nickel/iron object around 50m in diameter crashed into what is now the Arizona desert, some 37 miles East of Flagstaff, creating a crater more than one km in diameter and about 250m deep. This meteor weighed about half a million tons and was travelling at some 15 miles per second on impact.

Another object is thought to have crashed into the North American ice sheet around 13,000 years ago, causing the

extinction of some large animal species and the *Clovis people*, and had other colossal geological effects. The main one was the sudden cooling of the Northern hemisphere. This caused a large drop in temperature which lasted for some 1,300 years before the temperature began to rise very quickly to what it is today. It is known as the *Younger Dryas* period.

Some 66 million years ago, an Everest size (10 km) object crashed into what is now central America and wiped out the dinosaurs. This object created a crater some 180 km in diameter and killed over 70% of all life on Earth.

There are hundreds of thousands of these objects orbiting the sun, either as asteroids or comets. There is a group of asteroids known as Near Earth Objects (NEOs) that regularly pass close to Earth. One called Apophis can come very close to Earth on its orbit around the Sun. In the mid 1900s it was thought that it would crash into Earth and wipe out all life on this planet and was responsible for the two movies Deep Impact and Armageddon. The orbits of all the large NEOs are regularly checked by scientists to see if one is liable to hit the Earth. As of now, Apophis will pass quite close to us in 2029. Apophis has a diameter of 375m and will pass within 38,000 miles.

It is only a matter of time before one of these objects hits earth; many years into the future, I hope. Smaller ones, like the Arizona impact object, are difficult to see being too small and dark - like coal - to show up on images taken with telescopes. They could easily wipe out a city like London, so keep your tin hat handy!

Perhaps the next extinction event is already happening, caused by us with all our pollution, loss of wildlife and its habitat?!

The Quinquennial inspection explained

The Church of England requires each Diocese to ensure that all its churches are professionally surveyed at least every five years. In Chilmark, in late 2023, this Quinquennial (QQ) inspection was performed by a qualified Chartered Surveyor and paid for by the Salisbury Diocese. The purpose of the inspection/survey is to ensure that the fabric of the building is kept in good order. The surveyor uses a prescribed template to report matters that need attention on a scale of necessity: A) urgently, B) within 12 months, and C) things that should be made good within a five-year horizon / before the next QQ. The notion is akin to an MOT where urgent things are distinguished from advisories. Sadly, no Church gets a clean pass as far as I know. Typically, these are historic buildings and St Margaret's, Chilmark, is 12th century in parts. Helpfully, the spire was rebuilt in 1760.

Typically, the shape of these remedial works is split about 10%: 30%: 60% between the categories. For St Margaret of Antioch the results were that we need to spend:

- Category A £7,350 urgently = 6%
- Category B £39,850 within a year = 32%
- Category C £76,820 within the next 2-5 years = 62%

This is a sobering total of £124,020 and all figures need to have VAT added. We had Fabric reserves of just £22,480 at 31 December 2023, and intend to spend £28,550 in 2024, as I explained in the March issue. We typically raise about £18,000 a year for Fabric through kind donations.

The items in Category C are quite similar to those reported five years ago in the previous QQ. The Category C items are perhaps things to consider but not necessarily items to lose sleep about. For our Church these matters include:

- Category A = our heating system, some Belfry issues of debris and some minor roof repairs
- Category B = stonework repairs, lychgate, gutter repairs and numerous other smaller items
- Category C = spire repairs, damp issues, graveyard tomb repairs and numerous other items

In conclusion, thankfully, our Church is in reasonable order. It is of course more than 800 years old in parts and needs constant attention. Those matters are carefully considered by our Fabric Working Group (FWG) which is a subset of the Parochial Church Council (PCC). Focus Point

Change

There are many conspiracy theories in our world today. Some are recent while others have been around for generations. One such is that the world is flat. Change, whether it be changing our mind, location, or as a result of the choices and decisions of others, can be difficult for us all. We often want to hold on to what we know and what has worked for us in the past. We can be left with a sense that we have no control over what is happening. Unless of course we are the one instigating change.

Our reaction to any kind change, especially if we feel we have no control over it, can be what psychologists call fight, flight or freeze. Each of these can be useful when considering change; after all, resistance is a natural human response to change:

- In fight mode, we actively resist change, afraid it won't be done right. We just need to push harder and do it my way!
- In flight mode, we actively avoid change, afraid to get into a fight about the issue and don't have the time to get all worked up about it.
- In freeze mode, we might not take any action at all, afraid that we don't have all the answers and don't know what to do.

Following the departure of Graham Southgate in January, and the unlikelihood that he will be replaced with a full-time stipendiary priest, the Nadder Benefice faces a season of change. What's your response to this thought - Fight, Flight or Freeze? Perhaps there is a 4th option. To prayerfully seek a way forward that will be of benefit to all.

St Augustine, one of the early church theologians, is quoted as saying: pray as if everything depended on God and work as though everything depended on you.

Fonthill Estate News

The Fonthill Estate team have been busy over the winter, planting an impressive 57,000 young hedgerow saplings,

making up six miles of new hedge! This is the first of 15 miles of new hedges to be completed by early 2026. These hedges will form key habitats and food sources for a variety of species. They will provide thorny nesting cover for yellowhammers and grey partridges, nectar for a multitude of bees and butterflies as well as food plants for their caterpillars and safe hibernation for dormice and hedgehogs. Hedges also form weather-breaks for many species during harsh winter weather. The benefits are huge and the hedges will be essential to much of the estate's farm wildlife throughout the year.

A variety of species have been selected to provide a good mix of cover and food and crucially to provide nectar throughout the year, the species included are: Hawthorn, Blackthorn, Field Maple, Holly, Hazel, Spindle, Dogwood, Guelder Rose, Wayfaring tree, Bird Cherry, Privet, Dog Rose, Gooseberry.

The first Fonthill Gardens open day of the year in March was blessed by glorious sunshine – a rare treat this spring – with lots of visitors including children and happy dogs. The event raised the wonderful sum of £6,000 for the National Garden Scheme. The last of the three garden openings this year is on Sunday 9 June, 12pm - 5pm. This is in aid of a national charity called Atlantic Salmon Trust. More about this charity in the June issue of the VV.

Household Recycling Centres (HRCs) Permit Scheme Wiltshire Council has introduced a new HRC van and trailer permit scheme designed to cut council costs. All vans, pickups, or large trailers (between 1.8 and 3 metres) require a permit to visit any of Wiltshire's household recycling centres. Under the new system, which takes effect this month (May 2024), the previous physical paper permit will be replaced by an electronic system. Residents will have to pay a £20 non-refundable registration fee to sign up for the electronic permit. The new system will go live on 14 May and all existing permits will become invalid from 13 May. Hike in Fly Tipping & Litter Fines

Wiltshire Council has raised the sum of fixed penalty notice fines (FPNs) that people will have to pay when they are caught fly-tipping, handing their waste to rogue traders or dropping litter. From Tuesday 23 April, the FPNs will be raised to £1,000 for fly-tipping, £500 for littering and £600 for household duty of care, with no early payment discount. This is in line with changes in legislation that allow a raise in the fines.

The conditions attached to the original application were accepted, implicitly at least, by the applicant. In the important case of the stone type they were not followed. This was not trivial. It is apparent this was deliberate. Accordingly, the current application to vary should be refused.
